# **Pre-Optometry at NSU**

The Pre-Optometry program is designed to meet the requirements for the Doctor of Optometry degree granted by Northeastern State University. A GPA of 3.0 or high and an a verage OAT score of 300 or higher are minimum requirements to be competitive. A letter grade of C or better is required in all prerequisite courses. A **minimum of 90** college hours is required, however a **bachelor degree is strongly recommended.** Since this list is subject to change, it is the <u>student's responsibility</u> to obtain the latest information from the address shown on the reverse.

## **ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

#### Admission Requirements

The selection of students for admission to the College of Optometry is based on many factors; for instance, the applicant's academic performance, knowledge of optometry, motivation, extracurricular activities and interests, work experience, personal achievements, autobiography, and letters of reference. Careful consideration is given to the applicant's grade-point average, number of hours completed, and scores on the Optometry Admission test, as well as results of the personal on-campus interviews with the Admissions Committee. Beginning July 15, 2009, applicants for optometric study in the United States and Puerto Rico will use a common application service, **OptomCAS**. Prospective students will file one application, which can be sent to multiple schools and colleges of optometry.

In order to be **eligible for application** to the professional program in optometry education, a student must meet the following criteria and standards:

- 1. The applicant must have completed a minimum of 90 semester hours of work at an accredited college or university whose credits are acceptable toward a degree at Northeastern State University. Students accepted to optometry school without completing a bachelors degree (but have completed a minimum of 90 semester hours) may be eligible to receive a degree from NSU after successful completion of the first year of optometry school. This is an option requiring careful supervision by the pre-medical advisor. Strong preference is given to students who are completing, or have completed, a bachelor's degree.
- 2. The applicant must submit transcripts showing a composite grade-point average of all course work attempted of at least 2.7 based on a 4.0 scale.
- 3. The applicant must have taken the Optometry Admission Test (OAT) and had those scores submitted to NSUCO.

#### **Optometry Admission Test (OAT)**

All applicants to optometry school must take the Optometry Admission Test. Students should complete all the required courses before taking the test. To prepare for it, they may obtain information at: <a href="http://www.opted.org/info\_oat.cfm">www.opted.org/info\_oat.cfm</a> Students need to score at least 300 on the OAT in order to be competitive for admission. The average score for the fall 2011 class was 310.

#### Choosing a Major

"**Pre-optometry**" is not a major. There is no recommended major for pre-optometry students. Students should select a major in a discipline that will offer satisfying challenges and provide a viable alternative to optometry school if they are not admitted. The student should be working toward a baccalaureate degree in their discipline of choice while they are completing the pre-requisites for optometry school.

#### **Challenging Curriculum**

Optometry schools encourage a broad general curriculum in the social sciences and humanities, a high level of competence in the physical and biological sciences, as well as good communication skills is also important. Pre-optometry students should sequence their courses to demonstrate a capacity to handle the rigors of optometry school. Most pre-optometry students take from 15-18 hours each semester that includes at least 2 life science courses each semester. If a student chooses a lighter load of courses it will be apparent to the optometry programs that the student is protecting their GPA.

#### **Advising**

When students are ready to declare a major, they are assigned to the appropriate departmental advisor. Students should also visit regularly with the prehealth advisor since this person will likely be responsible for writing a recommendation letter for you.

#### Shadowing/Volunteering Experience

It is imperative that pre-optometry students obtain direct exposure to the world of optometry by shadowing/observing optometrists, working or volunteering in hospitals or nursing homes, visiting optometry schools, and keeping informed of new developments in optometry education/practice and current events in general. There is no minimum required hours of shadowing or volunteering required by the optometry programs, however the more hours (>50 hours) a student spends learning about the profession the more they will be able to demonstrate their knowledge and commitment to the profession.

#### Pre-optometry Club

The purpose of this organization is to aid pre-optometry students in the admission process to optometry school as well as to create a forum for students to communicate with optometry professionals.

#### Mock Interviews

Students may register to interview with the pre-medical faculty committee for a mock interview which can lead to a recommendation letter from the committee for medical school. Please contact the prehealth advisor for more information.
