The \$2,500 scholarship will be awarded to an NSU student studying Environmental Health and Safety Management. The student must also have a 3.0 grade point average. The scholarship is designed in recognition of the need for college graduates who have studied and understand environmental, cultural and health impacts and safety management techniques in large-scale construction projects, as well as the importance of partnerships with universities near such projects, including NSU.

The Oklahoma Safety Council has established a new annual scholarship for undergraduate students majoring in Environmental, Health and Safety Management (EHSM) at the Broken Arrow campus of Northeastern State University. The total scholarship amount for 2016-2017 will be \$1,000. Among other requirements, applicants will submit an essay describing why they have chosen to enter the environmental, health and safety profession. This year's application deadline at NSUBA was October 10, 2016.

Established in 1947, the Oklahoma Safety Council (OSC) is a non-governmental, not-for-profit, public service organization which promotes the adoption of safety, health, and environmental practices and procedures that prevent and mitigate human suffering and economic loss. Over 650 nominations were received and 297 individuals were selected as this year's winners.

Coldwell earned a Bachelor of Science in health care administration from NSU and a Master of Science in health care administration from Oklahoma State University in Tulsa. Coldwell has served as the director of physician practice for both Cherokee Nation Health Services and Northeastern Oklahoma Heart Center since August 2015. This role allows him to work with physicians to create and implement new service lines, which provide different avenues of treatment for patients in Tahlequah. Brian Hail, CEO of W.W. Hastings Hospital, a registered nurse and an EagleMed Six flight crew member. He and his team were seeking a candidate who had experience working with physicians. He wanted someone who had the ability to develop relationships with their physicians, as well as cultivate collaboration in order to provide better access to care for their patients.

"Wayne had a track record of meeting his goals at his previous position," said Hail. "Those goals were contingent on having positive professional relationships with the physicians he worked with there. CBT Business Professors Present Research at the Academy of Management Conference

On Sunday, August 7, Dr. Sandy Edwards presented a paper at the International Meeting of

the Academy of Management in Anaheim, California. The paper was entitled: "Diversity in the Discipline: Does entrepreneurship research really reflect the Academy?" The presentation was well received and centered on the authorship of entrepreneurship articles in major management and entrepreneurship journals. Findings suggest that North American males dominate the published literature in top journals while the academic field is actually much more diverse. For example, 77% of all entrepreneurship articles published in leading management journals were written by North American males while only 59% of the members of the Academy of Management are male and 69% of entrepreneurs are male. Further, 83% of the authors are from North American Universities while only 58% of Academy membership is from North America.

In addition, NSU instructor Julie Mercado presented research on "Classroom Role Models: The Effects of Professor Gender on Non-Traditional Student Success." Results of the role model research suggest that when both students and professors are male, there is little effect on the student's classroom performance, unless the student is a minority. In contrast, when the student and professor are both female, there are greater effects on classroom performance. However, when the student and professor genders are different (either a male professor to a female student OR a female professor to a male student), there are a number of negative effects on student performance. Interestingly, professor age was also a significant issue for female students.

Both presentations were part of a diversity symposium which included presentations from the United States Air Force Academy and the Florida International University.

NSU MBA Program Adds Emphases

The College of Business & Technology recently made big changes to its masters of business administration program, making it more beneficial and accessible to Northeastern State University students.

The 6-hour Elective Emphasis/Masters Research Project has been replaced by a choice of one of the following 12-hour emphases: general management, managerial accounting or finance, and Native American enterprise.

A second change included a reduction in the number of required courses from 10 to eight, as managerial economics and capstone practicum were dropped from the required list.

In the area of admissions, the minimum acceptable score from the admissions formula was adjusted to 1000. The changes take effect from fall 2016, creating a program that offers students more flexibility to select an emphasis that fits their needs, making them more marketable as job seekers after graduation.

According to Dr. Sandra Edwards, director of graduate business programs, these changes are expected to facilitate a better use of faculty resources for the college and to provide students with a more targeted set of courses for their career pursuits.

"The new degree plan will allow students to work on specific areas of emphasis, which allow them to have four courses in their emphasis versus the two general electives that were in the previous degree plan." She said the college plans to add further emphases in the future. "We are working on a potential emphasis in Environmental and Safety Management, a potential emphasis in Supply Chain and a potential emphasis in Health Care Administration."

By changing the minimum acceptable score for admission, the program becomes much more inclusive.

"The lowering of the total points for admissions will assist good students with a bit lower GPA to become part of our program," Edwards said. Following a unanimous vote in support of these changes by the CBT Curriculum Committee, approval was secured from the Graduate Council, as well as the University Curriculum Committee.

The college's commitment to continuous improvement in its curriculum demonstrates a progressive move toward even more industry marketability for its students.

Applications are open for the fall 2016 semester and the College will work with students on developing their preferred MBA emphasis.

CBT Assessment Update

For the past 3 years, the College of Business and Technology has been engaged in the process of developing an assessment model that would meet the requirements of our accrediting bodies and the University. We have accomplished so much. Each major that is subject to AC-BSP accreditation and the business core now have an assessment system in place. The chosen software to manage our assessment (Chalk and Wire) has become a staple in our college. Further, Chalk and Wire has been adopted by the University for University-wide assessment.

Our assessment system provides evidence that the College of Business and Technology meets the standards of accountability as defined by ACBSP, the Higher Learning Commission and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education which requires each Oklahoma college and university to assess academic program learning outcomes.

CBT's assessment reporting processes operate on an annual cycle, evaluating the current academic year's data. Each semester student outcomes are measured through a course embedded approach and each department analyzes and discusses the data to identify successes and necessary modifications to course or program outcomes, curriculum, or services provided. Accrediting agencies recognize this process as "closing the loop." These reports are sent annually to the Office of Institutional Effectiveness to be submitted to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. The reports will also be included as a large portion of the 2018 ACBSP self-study.

The next step is to expand the current system to include evidence of accountability to the University. Program learning outcomes can be easily aligned with the institutional learning outcomes. Existing program and course assessments can be used to measure the institutional learning outcomes. A committee has been formed to further develop this system.
