Welcome to a New Academic Year



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

Student Centered Research





Dr. Silver's HIST 4503: Old South class (left) toured the Hunter's Home where they focused on Old South memory and public history. Students learned about the process of researching enslaved people who lived and labored there along with the difficulty of reconstructing the past with limited sourcing. Students also realized the need for sites to be as authentic as possible to represent the history of the enslaved people at Hunter's Home.

Dr. lain Anderson directed the M.A. in American Studies Program for a fifth year.

Dr. Dave Corcoran participated in the Latin American Talk Series sponsored by Central New Mexico Community College and the Latin American & Iberian Institute of the University in Mexico. His talk was titled 1960s Colombia: Cold War & Culture.

Dr. Suzanne Farmer published an article "Patterns of Social Relationships and their Outcomes: The Case of Ireland," and presented "The Stock of a Nation": The Emergence of Competing Tory Political Economies in Late-Seventeenth-Century England at the Western Conference on British Studies.

Dr. Michelle Martin received the Linda Williams Reese Award for Outstanding Dissertation on Oklahoma History from the Oklahoma Historical Society, and was selected as a Mellon Applied History Fellow at the Center for the American West at the University of Colorado Boulder.



Community Outreach



The department sponsored an evening of historical music and storytelling with Dr. Harold Aldridge, NSU emeritus professor of Psychology. He grew up in Taft, one of Oklahoma's historic all-Black towns and is an author, filmmaker, musician, and horseman.

Dr. Aldridge narrated, played the guitar, and sang songs representative of blues history. Attendees left with a greater appreciation of the variety of American musical tradition and the role the blues played in sustaining communities of color.

Welcome to Our New Faculty

Dr. Lindsay Silver and Dr. Michelle M. Martin



Lindsay Silver joined the department in 2022 and is a Michigan native who spent the last 10 years in the South and the West. She earned her BA in History and MA in American Culture at the University of Michigan-Flint and PhD in American History at Louisiana State University. Dr. Silver joined our department last year. Her current book project, under advance contract with LSU Press is titled: "The Life and Death of Kate Townsend: Gender and Power in New Orleans Prostitution, 1858-1883." Her research interests include intersections of gender, race, and sexuality in American culture during the 19th century. As of summer 2023, she is the internship coordinator for the department.



Joining the department this year is Michelle Martin, a Michigan native. She completed her BA and MA degrees in history at Western Michigan University. From 1997-2015 she taught history at the community college and university levels and worked as a museum professional and historical consultant to the television and film industries in Kansas and Oklahoma. She earned her doctorate in history at the University of New Mexico in 2022. She specializes in Native American History, U.S. West, American History Precontact to 1925, Interracial Marriage and Family in North America, and Public History. Her current project explores interracial marriage in the Mvskoke Nation during the Indian Territorial period. Dr. Martin coordinates the Public History certificate program.
