Looking To The Future



PRE-HEALTH PROFESSIONS PREPARATION

Educational Preparation

Students preparing for careers in chiropractic, dentistry, medicine, occupational therapy, optometry, pharmacy, podiatry, physical therapy and veterinary medicine will eventually receive graduate degrees, all requiring a strong background in science.

"Pre-medical," "pre-dental," "pre-veterinary," etc., are not majors. Those designations simply mean that you are meeting admission requirements to those professional programs. While satisfying these, you should also be satisfying requirements for a baccalaureate degree. Professional schools do not recommend any particular major, but encourage you to choose a broad general curriculum in social sciences and humanities and to achieve a high level of competence in mathematical, physical and biological sciences.

Common prerequisites for health professions colleges include:

- » Biology
- » Chemistry
- » Physics
- » Psychology

Students are encouraged to meet with the Pre-health Advisor to get a complete list of prerequisites.

If you are preparing for an allied health pre-(dental hygiene, nursing, pharmacy or medical imaging and radiation sciences) career, you may apply to your chosen profession before completing a baccalaureate degree. Allied health preparation usually consists of 60-70 undergraduate credit hours weighted heavily with biological, mathematical, physical and social sciences.
