BAED 119

Embracing Online Education Degree Programs to Enhance Teacher Education - Traditional Presentation/Interactive Jessica Watts, OSU

This session explores one university's mission to address the teacher recruitment and retention demand by sharing the successes and challenges of launching an online undergraduate elementary education degree program.

BAED 121

AI in Education - Basics, Ethics, and Practical Applications -Traditional Presentation/Interactive Mark Jones & Shelli Sharber, ECU

This session will discuss fundamental aspects of AI tools, ethical considerations, and practical applications for use in education. Attendees will gain insights into responsibly utilizing AI tools for increased productivity.

Principal Power: Supporting Quality Early Childhood Education in Elementary Schools - Traditional Presentation/Interactive Barbara Jones, NSU

This proposal outlines a session geared to share strategies for Early Childhood educators in sharing the high quality early childhood practices that promoting academic rigor and overall success their students. In a time of increased demands resulting from high-stakes testing, elementary principals may feel pressured to require more academic rigor and transfer this pressure to teachers (Riley-Ayers & Figueras-Daniel, 2018). The push for academic accountability requires teachers to be more intentional in explaining the connection between child development, content, and classroom activities to their principals and co-workers (Riley-Ayers & Figueras-Daniel, 2018).


